OPCW/CSP-19 – National Statement of Portugal

Thank you MadamChairperson,

Let me start by congratulating you for your election as Chair of the Conference of States Parties and by expressing our confidence in your abilities to lead our work successfully. We wish you all the best in your term of office.

Madam Chairperson,

Portugal fully aligns itself with the statement delivered yesterday by Mr. Jacek Bylicaon behalf of the European Union. We would like nevertheless to come back to an aspect in particular of that statement.

Since CSP-18, Syria has remained at the top of the OPCW agenda, consuming a substantial part of its time and resources, both technically and at the level of the Policy-MakingOrgans. Inclusively, an OPCW technical mission to Syria was the target of an armed attack that could well have cost the lives of its members.

Over the same period, a vast international operation with the objective of eliminating the Syrian chemical weapons programme has taken place. This operation, not yet finished, has involved complex logistical and technical means, as well as huge costs.

As far as the elimination of the Syrian chemical weapons programmeis concerned, whilerecognizing that significant progress has been achieveddespite very difficult circumstances, it would be an easy mistake to conclude that the job is done.

The complexity of the process itself and the delays and uncertainties that have characterized it up to now, coupled withthe exceptional circumstances of the accession of Syria to the Chemical Weapons Convention, continue to be a source of concern to the International Community and require the continuation of aclosemonitoring by the OPCW.

In particular, the disturbing reports of the OPCW Fact Finding Mission in Syriaadd to the climate of uncertainty, as well as the growing delay in the destruction of the remaining chemical weapons production facilities and the gaps and inconsistences that keep surfacing in the Syrian declaration. It would also be reassuring to receive a clear sign from Syria as to how it intends to discharge itself of its responsibilities with regard to the costs of the elimination of its chemicals weapons programme and verification thereof.

In short, Syria must give full evidence of having irrevocably abandoned its chemical weaponsprogramme, not least by showing concrete and sustainable progress in relation to the issues mentioned above.

In this context, we welcome the appointment of the experienced Ambassador and our former colleague José ArturMedeirosas Special Advisor of the DG to Syria and wish him *boa* sorte – good luck – in his endeavors.

We request that this statement be circulated as an official document of the Conference.
