# REPORT ON THE WORKSHOP ON LEGISLATIVE ISSUES RELATED TO THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE CONVENTION SEVILLE, SPAIN, 26 - 27 OCTOBER 2000

- 1. The Government of Spain and the OPCW Secretariat together organised a workshop on legislative issues related to the implementation of the Chemical Weapons Convention, including the provisions on the monitoring of transfers of scheduled chemicals and their precursors. This workshop was held in Seville, Spain, on 26 and 27 October 2000 (the programme is contained in annex 1 to this report).
- 2. Sixty government officials from 48 States Parties attended the workshop (the list of participants is contained in annex 2 to this report). The participants exchanged views on their experiences of the establishment of the regulatory framework which is necessary to implement the Chemical Weapons Convention (hereinafter the "Convention").
- 3. Throughout the workshop there was lively discussion of the differing experiences of the various participating States Parties in the use of legislation to implement the Convention, with particular emphasis on, inter alia, the following: different codes for trade in dual-use goods; declarations of the import and export of chemicals involving members of customs unions, or common markets which, under their regulations, are not required to declare such transfers; problems arising from the fact that customs authorities commonly use the Harmonised System to name chemicals, rather than the CAS numbers prescribed by the Convention; and difficulties posed by the control of the transport of chemicals, including the use of free ports, free trade zones, and special regime customs zones.
- 4. In addition to the contributions from the host country, Spain, delegates from eighteen other States Parties (Albania, Argentina, Bangladesh, Belarus, Croatia, Cuba, the Czech Republic, Ecuador, Germany, Hungary, the Islamic Republic of Iran, Italy, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, Slovenia, Sweden, Switzerland, and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland) provided presentations on their own experience of establishing the regulatory framework for implementing the Convention.

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5. At the conclusion of the workshop all participants agreed that, even for those States Parties which already have substantial legislation in place, the way ahead is very challenging. A sustained effort by both States Parties and the policy-making organs of the OPCW will consequently be required for the foreseeable future.
