Statement by Ambassador H.E. Mr. Soe Lynn Han Permanent Representative of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar to the OPCW at the Twenty-Fifth Session of the Conference of the State Parties (The Hague, 30 November 2020)

We believe these trainings will practically strengthen Myanmar's technical and legislative capacities thereby enabling it to implement the CWC in a more efficient manner.

Furthermore, Myanmar, as a responsible member of the OPCW, stands ready to continue constructive cooperation not only with the OPCW but also with our fellow State Parties on bilateral context in accordance with the Convention so as to make concerted contributions to our common goal of creating the world a peaceful and prosperous home to the whole mankind.
