Poland is concerned that the number of reports that Russia uses Riot Control Agents (RCAs) as a method of warfare against Ukrainian soldiers is steadily growing. The Ukrainian authorities have documented so far over 12,500 such cases since the beginning of Russia's aggression. This means that the violation of the Chemical Weapons Convention (CWC) is done on a massive scale, in a systematic and organized manner, and that the perpetrators think that there will be no consequences for their actions.
