3. AGENDA ITEM THREE – Opening statement by the Director-General

The Council **noted** the opening statement by the Director-General (this document will be assigned an official reference number when it is made available to delegations).

4. AGENDA ITEM FOUR – Reports by the Chairperson and Vice-Chairpersons on intersessional activities

- 4.1 The Vice-Chairpersons and coordinators for clusters of issues reported to the Council on informal consultations held during the intersessional period: Ambassador Hadi Farajvand of the Islamic Republic of Iran on chemical weapons issues; Ambassador Mohamed Basri of Morocco on chemical industry and other Article VI issues; Ms Monika Lipert-Sowa of Poland on behalf of Ambassador Margareta Kassangana of Poland on administrative and financial issues; and Ambassador Jorge Carvajal of Chile on legal, organisational, and other issues.
- 4.2 The following facilitators also reported on the consultations that had been carried out during the intersessional period: Ms Dea Hannust of Estonia on assistance and protection against chemical weapons issues (Article X) (the report was posted on the external server of the OPCW); Ms Shiho Bamba of Japan on the reports of the Office of Internal Oversight and the External Auditor (the report was posted on the external server of the OPCW); Ms Lucía Rodríguez Fetzer of Guatemala on the implementation of the Action Plan for the Universality of the Chemical Weapons Convention; Ms Sandra Rodríguez of Peru on the progress report on the implementation of obligations under Article VII; and Mr Jamal Nasir of Pakistan on the full implementation of Article XI.

- 4.3 The Council **welcomed** the appointment of Ms Dea Hannust of Estonia as the new facilitator for assistance and protection against chemical weapons issues (Article X).
- 4.4 The Chairperson briefed the Council on his own activities during the intersessional period.
- 4.5 The Chairperson issued a Note entitled “Summary of the Process of the Appointment of the Next Director-General in 2025” (EC-111/2, dated 23 February 2026).

5. AGENDA ITEM FIVE – General debate

- 5.2 The delegation of Saudi Arabia delivered a joint statement on behalf of the Gulf Cooperation Council.
- 5.3 The following delegations exercised their right of reply: the United States of America, the Islamic Republic of Iran, China, Saudi Arabia (on behalf of the Gulf Cooperation Council), the Russian Federation (observer), and Australia (observer).

6. AGENDA ITEM SIX – Status of implementation of the Chemical Weapons Convention

Subitem 6(a): Reports by the Director-General on destruction-related issues

- 6.1 Further to a decision by the Council at its Sixty-Seventh Session (EC-67/DEC.6, dated 15 February 2012), the Council **considered** and **noted** a report by the Director-General on the overall progress with respect to the destruction of abandoned chemical weapons (EC-111/DG.11, dated 27 February 2026).

Subitem 6(b): Implementation of the Conference of the States Parties and Executive Council decisions on destruction-related issues

- 6.2 The Technical Secretariat (the Secretariat) provided an update to the Council on its destruction-related verification activities and on Article III-related submissions made during the intersessional period (the presentations were posted on the external server of the OPCW).
- 6.3 The delegation of Japan briefed the Council on its destruction-related activities (the presentation was posted on the external server of the OPCW). The delegation of China also briefed the Council on its destruction-related activities (the presentation was posted on the external server of the OPCW), and made a further statement.
- 6.4 The delegation of Japan made a statement.
- 6.5 The delegation of China exercised its right of reply.
- 6.6 Further to decision EC-67/DEC.6 and the Destruction Plan Beyond the Year 2022 for the Chemical Weapons Abandoned by Japan in the People's Republic of China (EC-101/DEC.2, dated 4 October 2022) attached as annex 3 to the Council's decision EC-67/DEC.6, a national paper by China (EC-111/NAT.4, dated 11 February 2026) and a national paper by Japan (EC-111/NAT.3, dated 16 February 2026) on the overall progress of the destruction of chemical weapons abandoned by Japan on the territory of China were circulated to the members of the Council.
- 6.7 The Council **reaffirmed** the obligation to complete the destruction of all abandoned chemical weapons (ACW) in accordance with the provisions of the Chemical Weapons Convention (the Convention) and the relevant decisions of the Council by recalling that the Abandoning State Party shall provide all necessary financial, technical, expert, facility as well as other resources and that the Territorial State Party shall provide appropriate cooperation, **expressed its determination** to remain seized of the matter, and **urged** the Abandoning State Party to continue to make the fullest possible effort to complete the destruction of chemical weapons abandoned by Japan on the territory of China as early as possible in accordance with the Council's decision (EC-67/DEC.6) and its annex 3 in a faithful manner, and to address challenges including ensuring the safety of people and protecting the environment.
- 6.8 The Council **recalled** that the Destruction Plan Beyond the Year 2022 for the Chemical Weapons Abandoned by Japan in the People's Republic of China (EC-101/DEC.2) stipulated the common recognition regarding the destruction of ACW with the Mobile Destruction Facility, the destruction of ACW in Haerbaling (Jilin Province), the destruction of other ACW, including consultation in making a medium- to long-term plan for the excavation of ACW, the consolidation of ACW storehouses, continuing to use its best efforts to collect and provide information on traces of ACW by the Abandoning State Party and continuing to hold consultations, and that the relevant States Parties jointly affirmed that they would accelerate in all aspects the destruction process and that their best efforts will be used towards the completion of the destruction of ACW as early as possible.

- 6.9 The Council **recalled** that the review of the destruction of ACW was welcomed by the Third Review Conference¹ and the report of the Third Review Conference (RC-3/3*, dated 19 April 2013), which reaffirmed the role of the Council, the Conference of the States Parties (the Conference), and the Review Conference with regard to the issues related to ACW destruction as defined in the provisions of the Convention and in the Council's decision (EC-67/DEC.6), **welcomed** the review of this issue by the Fourth Review Conference, and **noted** the constructive discussion related to this issue at the Fifth Review Conference.
- 6.10 The Council **welcomed** that a total of 14 on-site inspections to the ACW facilities had been successfully conducted in 2025.

Subitem 6(c): Elimination of Any Remnants of the Assad-Era Syrian Chemical Weapons Programme

- 6.11 Further to its decision at its Eighty-Third Session (EC-83/DEC.5, dated 11 November 2016), the Council decided to place "Elimination of the Syrian Chemical Weapons Programme" on the agenda of all future Council sessions until the Council determines that all elements of the Syrian chemical weapons programme have been eliminated. At its 110th Session, the Council decided to henceforth refer to this item as "Elimination of Any Remnants of the Assad-Era Syrian Chemical Weapons Programme" (paragraph 11 of EC-110/DEC.1, dated 8 October 2025).
- 6.12 As stated in Note by the Director-General EC-81/DG.5 (dated 25 January 2016), all of the chemicals declared by the Syrian Arab Republic that had been removed from its territory in 2014 have been destroyed. The Secretariat has also verified the destruction of all 27 chemical weapons production facilities declared by the Syrian Arab Republic (EC-89/DG.1, dated 24 July 2018).
- 6.13 At its Sixty-Sixth Meeting, the Council noted a Note by the Secretariat (EC-M-66/S/1, dated 9 December 2024) circulating Note Verbale No. NV/ODG-636/24 addressed to the Permanent Representation of the Syrian Arab Republic to the OPCW on the situation in the Syrian Arab Republic in relation to the Syrian chemical weapons programme. The Council decided to remain seized of the matter.
- 6.14 The Secretariat provided a briefing to the States Parties on 4 March 2026 on its activities related to the Syrian Arab Republic.
- 6.15 The Secretariat circulated two Notes entitled "Summary Update of the Activities Carried Out by the OPCW Fact-Finding Mission in Syria" (S/2473/2025, dated 24 December 2025) and "Elimination of the Syrian Chemical Weapons Programme – Status Update" (S/2502/2026, dated 9 March 2026).
- 6.16 The Council **noted** five reports by the Director-General on progress in the elimination of the Syrian chemical weapons programme (EC-111/DG.1, dated 23 October 2025; EC-111/DG.2, dated 24 November 2025; EC-111/DG.3, dated 24 December 2025; EC-111/DG.4, dated 23 January 2026; and EC-111/DG.10, dated 24 February 2026).

- 6.17 The Council **noted** four national papers by the Syrian Arab Republic on the activities related to the destruction of Syrian chemical weapons and their production facilities (EC-111/HP/NAT.1, dated 15 October 2025; EC-111/P/NAT.2 and EC-111/P/NAT.3, both dated 2 January 2026; and EC-111/P/NAT.4, dated 22 January 2026) as well as a national paper by the Syrian Arab Republic on the activities related to the destruction of the Assad regime's chemical weapons and production facilities (EC-111/NAT.7, dated 25 February 2026).
- 6.18 The following delegations made statements: the Syrian Arab Republic (observer), Cyprus (observer) (on behalf of the European Union and Andorra, Albania, Armenia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Georgia, Liechtenstein, Monaco, Montenegro, North Macedonia, Norway, the Republic of Moldova, San Marino, and Ukraine), Morocco, Guatemala, the United States of America, Germany, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Poland, the Republic of Korea, Pakistan, Panama, the Czech Republic, Italy, Japan, China, India, France, the Islamic Republic of Iran, Saudi Arabia, Algeria, the Russian Federation (observer), Sweden (observer) (on behalf of Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway, and Sweden), the Netherlands (observer), Türkiye (observer), Canada (observer) (on behalf of Australia, Canada, and New Zealand), and Bosnia and Herzegovina (observer).
- 6.19 The following delegations exercised their right of reply: the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the Islamic Republic of Iran.
- 6.20 The Council **noted** a Note by the Director-General entitled "Report on the Work of the Declaration Assessment Team" (EC-111/HP/DG.1, dated 9 March 2026).

Subitem 6(d): Other verification-related issues

- 6.21 The Secretariat provided an update to the Council on its other verification-related activities (the presentation was posted on the external server of the OPCW).

Subitem 6(e): Destruction-related plans and facility agreements

- 6.22 The Secretariat submitted to the Council a Note on "Modifications to the Facility Arrangement between the Organisation for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons and the Government of Australia Regarding On-Site Inspections at the Schedule 1 Facility for Protective Purposes at the Defence Science and Technology Group, Melbourne, Australia" (EC-111/S/1, dated 17 February 2026).

Subitem 6(f): Addressing the threat from chemical weapons use

- 6.23 The Council **noted** the regular report by the Director-General to the Council on progress made in the implementation of the decision of the Conference entitled "Addressing the Threat from Chemical Weapons Use" (C-SS-4/DEC.3, dated 27 June 2018) (EC-111/DG.13, dated 9 March 2026).
- 6.24 The Secretariat circulated a Note entitled "Fifth Report by the OPCW Investigation and Identification Team Pursuant to Paragraph 10 of Decision C-SS-4/DEC.3 'Addressing the Threat from Chemical Weapons Use', Kafr Zeita (Syrian Arab Republic) – 1 October 2016" (S/2478/2026, dated 21 January 2026), which had been provided to the Council and to the United Nations Secretary-General for their consideration.

- 6.25 The following delegations made statements: Spain (on behalf of the International Partnership Against Impunity for the Use of Chemical Weapons), China, Australia (observer) (on behalf of Australia, Canada and New Zealand), Austria (observer), and the Syrian Arab Republic (observer).
- 6.26 At its 109th Session, the Council noted the requests to obtain clarification from the Sudan in accordance with paragraph 4 of Article IX of the Convention, from Mauritania, Chad, and Benin, as well as the clarifications provided by the Sudan pursuant to subparagraph 4(b) of Article IX of the Convention (paragraphs 6.24 to 6.26 and 6.31 of EC-109/6, dated 11 July 2025). At its 110th Session, the Council decided to remain seized of this matter.
- 6.27 The following delegations made statements on this issue: the Sudan, the United States of America, and France.
- 6.28 Upon request of the delegation of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, a joint letter from France, Germany, the Netherlands, Sweden, and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland dated 14 February 2026 was circulated to the members of the Council (EC-111/NAT.1, dated 14 February 2026).
- 6.29 Upon request of the delegation of the Russian Federation, Notes Verbales No. 13 (dated 16 February 2026), No. 16 (dated 24 February 2026), and No. 19 (dated 5 March 2026) were circulated to the members of the Council (EC-111/NAT.2, dated 16 February 2026; EC-111/NAT.6, dated 24 February 2026; and EC-111/NAT.8, dated 5 March 2026).
- 6.30 The Council received a joint request from France, Germany, the Netherlands, Sweden, and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland to obtain clarification from the Russian Federation in accordance with paragraph 4 of Article IX of the Convention (EC-111/NAT.9, dated 5 March 2026).
- 6.31 The joint request was forwarded by the Chairperson, on behalf of the Council, and through the Director-General, to the Russian Federation in accordance with subparagraph 4(a) of Article IX of the Convention (EC-111/S/3, dated 5 March 2026).
- 6.32 The delegation of France delivered a joint statement on behalf of France, Germany, the Netherlands, Sweden, and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.
- 6.33 The delegation of the Russian Federation (observer) made a statement.
- 6.34 The following delegations also made statements on this issue: the United States of America, Germany, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, China, the Czech Republic, New Zealand, the Islamic Republic of Iran, Sweden (observer), and the Netherlands (observer).
- 6.35 The following delegations exercised their right of reply: the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, France, the Russian Federation (observer), and the Netherlands (observer).
- 6.36 The Council **decided** to remain seized of the matter.

- 6.37 The following delegations made statements on other issues under this agenda subitem: Cyprus (observer) (on behalf of the European Union and Andorra, Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Liechtenstein, Monaco, Montenegro, North Macedonia, Norway, the Republic of Moldova, San Marino, and Ukraine), Ukraine, Poland, the Republic of Korea, New Zealand (on behalf of Australia, Canada and New Zealand), China, the Czech Republic, Germany, France, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Italy, Japan, the United States of America, Bangladesh, Lithuania, the Russian Federation (observer), and Norway (observer) (on behalf of Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway, and Sweden).
- 6.38 The following delegations exercised their right of reply: Ukraine, the United States of America, the Russian Federation (observer), Canada (observer), and Estonia (observer).
- 6.39 Upon request of the delegation of the Russian Federation, Note Verbale No. 15 (dated 24 February 2026), was circulated to the members of the Council (EC-111/NAT.5, dated 24 February 2026).

Subitem 6(g): Timely submission of declarations under Article VI

- 6.40 Further to a decision by the Council at its Fifty-First Session (EC-51/DEC.1, dated 27 November 2007), the Council **noted** a status report by the Director-General on the timely submission by States Parties of declarations under Article VI of the Convention for the period 1 January to 31 December 2025 (EC-111/DG.5, dated 27 January 2026).

Subitem 6(h): Status of implementation of Article X

- 6.41 The Council **considered** and **noted** a report by the Director-General on the “Status of Implementation of Article X of the Chemical Weapons Convention as at 31 December 2025” (EC-111/DG.8, dated 23 February 2026).

Subitem 6(i): Implementation by the Technical Secretariat in 2025 of the regime governing the handling of confidential information

- 6.42 The Council **considered** and **noted** a report by the Director-General on the implementation of the regime governing the handling of confidential information by the Secretariat in 2025 (EC-111/DG.6 C-31/DG.1, dated 3 February 2026).

7. AGENDA ITEM SEVEN – Countering chemical terrorism

- 7.1 The Council **considered** and **noted** a Note by the Director-General on the status of the OPCW’s contribution to global anti-terrorism efforts (EC-111/DG.12, dated 5 March 2026).
- 7.2 The Chairperson of the Open-Ended Working Group on Terrorism (OEWG-T), Ambassador Vusimuzi Philemon Madonsela of South Africa, briefed the Council on the work of the OEWG-T during the intersessional period (EC-111/WP.1, dated 12 March 2026).
- 7.3 The following delegations made statements: Morocco, Bangladesh, Algeria, China, the Islamic Republic of Iran, Yemen (observer), the Russian Federation (observer), and Bosnia and Herzegovina (observer).
- 7.4 The following delegations exercised their right of reply: Ukraine and the Russian Federation (observer).

8. AGENDA ITEM EIGHT – Emerging technologies

- 8.1 The Secretariat briefed the Council on the status of work of the Temporary Working Groups on Artificial Intelligence and Chemical Forensics of the Scientific Advisory Board.
- 8.2 The following delegations made statements: Cyprus (observer) (on behalf of the European Union and Andorra, Albania, Armenia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Georgia, Monaco, Montenegro, North Macedonia, Norway, the Republic of Moldova, San Marino, Serbia, and Ukraine), Morocco, Algeria, Bangladesh, the United States of America, Germany, Ukraine, Italy, the Republic of Korea, France, China, the Czech Republic, India, Saudi Arabia, Rwanda, the Russian Federation (observer), the United Republic of Tanzania (observer), and Bosnia and Herzegovina (observer).

9. AGENDA ITEM NINE – Administrative and financial matters

Subitem 9(a): Nominations for membership of the Advisory Body on Administrative and Financial Matters

- 9.1 The Council **noted** a Note by the Secretariat on a nomination for membership of the Advisory Body on Administrative and Financial Matters (ABAF) (EC-111/S/4, dated 10 March 2026), and **appointed** Mr Jason Loeffler of the United States of America as a member of the ABAF to replace Ms Hollie Marie Mance of the United States of America, as of 12 March 2026.

Subitem 9(b): Status of implementation of the External Auditor's recommendations

- 9.2 The Secretariat circulated to the Council a report on the status of implementation of the recommendations of the External Auditor (EC-111/S/2, dated 19 February 2026).
- 9.3 The following delegations made statements: the United States of America, Argentina, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Belgium, and South Africa.
- 9.4 The Legal Adviser provided a legal opinion.

Subitem 9(c): Report on the status of implementation of the enterprise resource planning system

- 9.5 Further to the decision by the Conference at its Nineteenth Session on the implementation of an enterprise resource planning (ERP) system and the establishment of a special fund for this purpose (C-19/DEC.7, dated 3 December 2014), the Council **noted** a Note by the Director-General reporting on the status of implementation of the ERP system (EC-111/DG.9, dated 24 February 2026).

Subitem 9(d): Adjustment to the Director-General's gross salary

- 9.6 In accordance with a decision of the Conference at its First Special Session (C-SS-1/DEC.4, dated 25 July 2002) stipulating that the terms of appointment of the Director-General shall be subject to adjustments by the Council to keep the terms in line with those of other executive heads within the United Nations system, the Council **considered** a draft decision adjusting the Director-General's gross salary (EC-111/DEC/CRP.1/Rev.1, dated 5 March 2026).

- 9.7 The delegation of the United States of America made a statement.
- 9.8 The Director-General made a statement.
- 9.9 The delegation of South Africa made a statement.
- 9.10 The Legal Adviser provided a legal opinion.
- 9.11 The above-mentioned draft decision was voted on by the Council pursuant to Rules 36 and 42(b) of its Rules of Procedure. The vote led to the following results: 40 in favour (Algeria, Angola, Argentina, Bangladesh, Belgium, Brazil, Cameroon, Chile, China, the Czech Republic, Denmark, Ecuador, El Salvador, France, Germany, Ghana, Greece, Guatemala, India, Iran (Islamic Republic of), Italy, Japan, Lithuania, Malaysia, Mexico, Morocco, New Zealand, Nigeria, North Macedonia, Pakistan, Panama, Poland, the Republic of Korea, Rwanda, Saudi Arabia, South Africa, Spain, the Sudan, Ukraine, and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland); 1 against (the United States of America); and no abstentions. In light of that result, the Council **adopted** the decision (EC-111/DEC.1, dated 12 March 2026).
- 9.12 Pursuant to Rule 44 of the Rules of Procedure of the Council, the delegations of Argentina and the United States of America made statements explaining their votes.

10. AGENDA ITEM TEN – The OPCW Programme for Africa

- 10.1 The Council **considered** and **noted** a Note by the Director-General on the seventh phase of the Programme to Strengthen Cooperation with Africa on the Chemical Weapons Convention (EC-111/DG.7, dated 19 February 2026).
- 10.2 The following delegations made statements: Rwanda (on behalf of the African Group), Tunisia (observer), and the United Republic of Tanzania (observer).

11. AGENDA ITEM ELEVEN – Election of the Chairperson and Vice-Chairpersons of the Executive Council

- 11.1 In accordance with Rule 6 of its Rules of Procedure, and with effect from 12 May 2026, the Council **elected** Ambassador Mohamed Basri of Morocco as its new Chairperson for a term of office ending on 11 May 2027, and its new Vice-Chairpersons for the same period: Ambassador Shen Bo of China; Ambassador René Miko of the Czech Republic; Ambassador Ana Cristina Rodríguez Pineda of Guatemala; and Ambassador Govert Jan Bijl de Vroe of the Netherlands.
- 11.2 The following delegations made statements: Morocco and the Russian Federation (observer).

12. AGENDA ITEM TWELVE – Report by the Committee on Relations with the Host Country
