**STATEMENT BY H.E. AMBASSADOR PAUL WILKE  
ACTING PERMANENT REPRESENTATIVE OF THE NETHERLANDS TO THE OPCW  
AT THE FIFTY-FIFTH MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL**

Mr Chairperson,

My delegation thanks the Director-General for his statement and associates itself with the statement pronounced by the Permanent Representative of Estonia on behalf of the European Union.

Once again, the world finds itself confronted with the confirmed use of a chemical weapon in the Syrian Arab Republic. And this time it is not a crude device dispersing chlorine, but the far deadlier nerve agent sarin.

The report of the Fact-Finding Mission (FFM), S/1510/2017 (dated 29 June 2017), leaves no room for doubt about its conclusions. The report is detailed and describes the meticulous procedures followed by the FFM. We commend the FFM for the transparency with which the team operates and we thank the members of the FFM for their dedication and professionalism.

The use of sarin is a flagrant violation of the norms laid down in the Convention and of United Nations Security Council resolution 2118 (2013). We condemn this in the strongest possible terms. It amounts to a war crime and those responsible must -and will- be held accountable for their deeds.

The findings of the FFM report will be transmitted to the OPCW-United Nations Joint Investigative Mechanism (JIM) and the Netherlands expresses the hope that the JIM shall be able to identify the perpetrators of this heinous act, so that they can be brought to justice.

The confirmation that sarin was used in Khan Shaykhun again highlights the importance that any doubts that remain about the veracity and completeness of the Syrian initial declaration be resolved as soon as possible. It is unacceptable that many doubts remain despite more than three years of intensive attempts by the Declaration Assessment Team to obtain clarification on the long list of outstanding issues.

The Syrian Arab Republic must give full disclosure about its chemical weapons programme, as required under the Chemical Weapons Convention, to enable the Technical Secretariat to verify that its chemical weapons programme has been completely dismantled and all chemical weapons stockpiles have been destroyed.



The horrific attack in Khan Shaykhun is the latest demonstration of the inhumane character of the conflict in the Syrian Arab Republic and of the utter disregard for the principles of international humanitarian law and for the lives of civilians.
